The next morning, the prefects were separated into those which went for morning devotion and those who went for a morning game of 'electric fence'. After that, the prefectorial board led a morning exercise session which was followed by breakfast. The prefects then proceeded to the campsite area where the Tadom Hills Resort staff supervised the tent-building session. After the prefects moved their luggage to the tents, the final session by World Vision was held, where the prefects presented their plans. Once they had lunch, the Tadom Hills Resort staff organized a flying fox, abseiling, and Tadom Splash (including bamboo rafting and a water slide) activity session. After dinner, the prefects gathered around a campfire built at the campsite. It was here where there was a skit session and a sing-along, and the custom breakclap was also taught.

The third day started with morning devotion which was followed by breakfast. After that, a 'survival game' was held for the prefects, in which they had to work in their allocate groups to resolve the conflict in a mystery story. After they successfully solved the game, a photo session was held before they returned back to school.
